IMPACT: Fun, But Exhausting

With the forecast calling for rain and the numbers smaller (no doubt) due to the pandemic, IMPACT seemed to be destined for a dismal outcome this year. However, a few things remained the same this year as in every other year. First, IMPACT 2021 gave an opportunity for believers to serve and fellowship in a different setting. Shiloh Hackett, IMPACT Coordinator for Tennessee summed it up perfectly: "I am hopeful IMPACT helps the way in which it was designed. It truly reflects our focus—people from all parts of the denomination working together for the same purpose."

That purpose, to reach the community with the gospel, was the second goal accomplished through IMPACT 2021. At Cross Creek FWB Church in Olive Branch, Mississippi, volunteers offered a free car wash. The first carload that arrived was interested in details about the church and service times. As the day progressed, more people stopped, and the volunteers were busy despite the gloomy weather. When asked why she chose to volunteer to help wash cars, Baylor, a fourth grader from Kentucky said, "It's fun, and you get to help people at the same time!" Another young volunteer confessed he had never washed cars before. After a while on the job, he was asked how he felt about washing cars now. Soaked, soapy, but smiling in his "IMPACT Memphis" t-shirt, he replied, "It's fun!"

Another group of volunteers conducted a prayer walk through the community with Pastor Paul Bryant. This is something the church does regularly, so it was unique to be able to help with their ongoing ministry in addition to something new like the car wash. In total, 51 volunteers washed 34 cars and prayed over 621 houses. The prayer walk team had the opportunity to pray with 15 different individuals about various needs and concerns.

A second team of volunteers worked at Faith FWB Church in Oakland, Tennessee, with Pastor Jordan Osborn. They participated in Operation Saturation: canvassing the neighborhoods near the church. Forty volunteers passed out 2,000plus cards providing information about the church. The church will have an open house at the end of the month, and the flyers were designed to invite community members to come explore the church. Convention photographer Rodney Yerby said this about volunteering at Faith: "It was about 90° with 100% humidity, but we had a really good turnout and a great time together!"

Meet the Speakers

Keith Burden (Monday Evening) answered the call to preach at age 16. He completed studies at Randall University and Moody Bible Institute. Ordained to the gospel ministry in 1975, Keith was either an associate minister or pastor for 27 years. He served as assistant clerk and clerk of the National Association for 22 years before being elected executive secretary of the denomination in 2002 where he served until 2019.

Eddie Moody (Tuesday Evening) currently serves as executive secretary of the NAFWB. For over 25 years, he engaged in training professional counselors, primarily at North Carolina Central University where he was both professor of counselor education and associate dean of the school of education. He also served as pastor at Tippett's Chapel in Clayton, North Carolina, for almost two decades. He was awarded as the Counselor of the Year in 2016 by the Licensed Professor Counselor Association of North Carolina.

MISSING Conventions?

Why are we "missing" conventions? This is one of the most frequently asked questions regarding the annual meeting of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Askers often speculate on which conventions were canceled and why. Was it World War II? Or some natural catastrophe? Why is the nearly 87-year-old denomination meeting for only the 85th time, when even COVID-19 didn't keep the General Board from gathering to do business for the denomination in 2020?

The answer to this intriguing question is a little less exciting than some popular theories might suggest. When the denomination united in 1935 at Cofer's Chapel in Nashville, Tennessee, the body determined not to meet again until 1938, making it a triennial convention. The 1935 minutes observes the "responsibility of determining where the next session of the National Association is to be held three years from now was left in the hands of the Executive Board."

However, by the time the denomination gathered in Bryan, Texas, in 1938 for its second session, it had become clear a triennial convention was insufficient for the work of the rapidly growing association. During that meeting, delegates amended Article IX of the Constitution (below) to make the National Convention an annual event.

Meetings. This National Association shall hold its regular meetings annually. The place of meeting to be alternated each year: east of the Mississippi River one year and west of the Mississippi the next year; and place of meeting to be decided by a vote of the body. The time of meeting to be on Tuesday following the Second Sunday in July, and to remain in session until its work is completed.

Since that decision in 1938, the track record of the annual convention reads much like the familiar old U.S. Postal Service slogan: *neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays Free Will Baptists from their annual meeting!*

Why IMPACT? A local pastor shares his thoughts:
