RETURN TO RALEIGH

Raleigh—the capital of North Carolina, the home of a variety of museums, and the gathering point of home cooking, soul food, BBQ, and Asian cuisine—has much to offer Free Will Baptists. Raleigh has 40 free historic attraction and/ or museums throughout the city. Three include: **North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences** (naturalsciences. org), **North Carolina Museum of History** (ncmuseumofhistory.org), and the **City of Raleigh Museum** (raleighnc.gov/ parks/places/city-raleigh-museum).

One unforgettable destination in the City Center is a restaurant called **A Place at the Table** (300 W Hargett). At this restaurant, people can work an hour in exchange for a meal, pay the suggested price (or more to help pay for someone else), or simply pay what they can.

The unique non-profit makes it possible for a wide variety of people to enjoy a professionally pepared, delicious meal. At least 80 people volunteer their time every week. Beth, one of the regular volunteers says, "It is our mission to make a good meal available for everyone—no matter who they are!" Take advantage of this unique opportunity to enjoy great food while helping others.

Another unique Raeligh eatery is **Carroll's Kitchen**, which gives women overcoming trauma a place to work, learn new skills, and re-enter the community. Carroll's has already helped 26 women from Raleigh.
